2018 marks 25 years OCTU has had a collective agreement with OSSTF as their union! Quoted as being "one of the most comprehensive first collective agreements..." we should be proud of where we started as a bargaining unit and where we have grown to today. We truly have one of the best support staff collective agreements in OSSTF and that is thanks to the local collective bargaining team that negotiated until 4:30 a.m. on February 6, 1993 to protect the rights of our bargaining unit! Staffing Update:

Recently, we have entered into the final stages of OCTU staffing and are near completion. This will mark the earliest completion of OCTU staffing in years! We have continued to discuss the need to complete staffing earlier than what had become the "norm" of the end of June, and we are happy to report OCTU staffing is near completion. We have had some reductions in certain areas, along with growth in others. Overall, we are seeing additional positions added to the OCTU FTE compliment, which is positive news for the bargaining unit. These positions affect OCTU members located in elementary, secondary, and board office locations. Staffing changes have been communicated to all affected members by joint communication from hr and the union.

Why celebrate Pride 2018?

Populist politics: politicians promoting a simple and straightforward message that caters to the emotions of people. It's a type of politics that promises simple solutions to incredibly complex challenges in our society. Slogans like "clean up the swamp" and declarations that "I represent the common man" are simplistic and without much substance, but they resonate in people's minds. People are generally worried about their social status and security, and are often threatened by changes to their environments.

Toronto Star columnist Sabrina Nanji recently wrote, "Populism doesn't just grow on a tree like apples or pears. It has to be produced...you have to have messengers go out who are stoking fears and divisions because one of the crucial aspects of populism is it is turning people against some out-group." Given that this sentiment is on the rise in Ontario, it is no surprise that racism, anti-Semitism, Islamphobia and anti-LGBTQ2SI have reared their ugly and despicable heads again in 2018.

Every year, across the province, communities come together to celebrate Pride. Toronto has one of the largest Pride celebrations in the world. It's an event that honours the history of, and empowers people of, diverse sexual orientation, gender identities, and gender expression. From the raising of the Pride Flag on June 1, to Family Pride, the Dyke March, Trans Pride and finally, the Pride Parade, Pride events are symbols of unity, equity, inclusion and diversity.

The theme for PrideToronto 2018 is 35 years of AIDS Activism, which reflects the deep impact the community has faced both in the past and in the present. More than ever, Ontarians require politicians who have a message that is multi-faceted—one that advocates for multiple identities and reflects the complexity of our society. Celebrating Pride in 2018 is more important than it has ever been, as it affirms a place in society for people with diverse histories, needs and identities. And it is inexcusable, if not insulting, that in 2018, some Ontarian politicians do not want to be a part of Pride Celebrations. Please support your local celebrations.


OSSTF/FEESO will be marching in the Pride Toronto Parade on Sunday, June 25.

National Indigenous Peoples Day

June 21 is National Indigenous Peoples Day. This is a day for all Canadians to recognize and celebrate the unique heritage, diverse cultures and outstanding contributions of First Nations, Inuit and Métis peoples. The Canadian Constitution recognizes these three groups as Aboriginal peoples, also known as Indigenous peoples.

Although these groups share many similarities, they each have their own distinct heritage, language, cultural practices and spiritual beliefs.

In cooperation with Indigenous organizations, the Government of Canada chose June 21, the summer solstice, for National Aboriginal Day, now known as National Indigenous Peoples Day. For generations, many Indigenous peoples and communities have celebrated their culture and heritage on or near this day due to the significance of the summer solstice as the longest day of the year.




OFFENCE DECLARATION

Workplace Sexual Violence,

Assault and Harassment Survey 2018

For Action

As outlined in the 2017 Annual Action Plan, OSSTF/FEESO is conducting a survey of members that will address the issue of workplace sexual violence, assault and harassment. The survey is available in both English and French.

The Federation asked the Vector Poll™ to conduct this survey by sending an email to a random sample of members asking them to complete a short, confidential survey. The email will include a unique passcode required to access the survey. The passcode will ensure only one survey is completed per member. In addition to the random sample of members, all OSSTF/FEESO members who attend committee and council meetings, as well as our Annual Meeting of the Provincial Assembly, are included in the random sample.

There will be no disclosure of any individual member's opinions. The passcode is not linked to a member name when Vector Research analyzes the results.

The survey results will help OSSTF/FEESO to make informed decisions about the development of resources for leaders and members, as well as Federation policies, procedures and practices.

The Vector Poll™ is a member of the Marketing Research and Intelligence Association (MRIA), the standards setting body for opinion research in Canada. The MRIA website is www.mria-arim.ca, where you can view the research industry privacy code.
